HEATHER MEGILL, 2026-28 President, Co-Chair Programme Committee 2025-26

Heather is a woman of many talents whose diverse experiences reflect a lifelong commitment to learning, service, and community involvement.

Born in British Columbia and raised in St. John's, Newfoundland, Heather developed an early appreciation for history and education. She earned a Bachelor of Arts in Military History from Memorial University of Newfoundland and later completed a Master of Science in Teaching at SUNY Potsdam.

For 19 years, Heather served as an officer in the Canadian Armed Forces Reserve, including with the SD&G Highlanders. While raising her two children, Bruce and Rose, with her husband Jim in Cornwall, she commuted regularly to Potsdam, New York, to complete her master's degree—a testament to her determination and dedication.

Education has always been one of Heather's passions. She has spent many years teaching English as a Second Language (ESL) and currently teaches through Tri-County Literacy. Her enthusiasm for helping others learn is evident whenever she speaks about her students and their achievements.

Heather has also demonstrated a strong commitment to public service throughout her life. She first ran for Cornwall City Council in the 1990s and later served as the Liberal candidate for Stormont–Dundas–South Glengarry in the 2018 provincial election and the 2019 federal election.

A dedicated volunteer and community leader, Heather has contributed her time and expertise to numerous organizations. In her professional life, she served as Vice-President of the Elementary Teachers' Federation in Eastern Ontario and held leadership roles in several labour organizations. Her community involvement has included service with the City of Cornwall's Recreation Advisory Committee, Community Living, the 1993 Ontario Winter Games, the Rotary Club of Cornwall, and the Kinette Club. Today, she continues her commitment to community service as Vice-President of the SDG Historical Society, a member of the Cornwall and District Labour Council and, of course, as President of CFUW Cornwall & District.

Scholarships presented as CFUW concludes celebrations

The Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) Cornwall and District's annual general meeting (AGM) saw approximately 60 members, 2025 CFUW Scholarship recipients and guests gather for dinner to celebrate the achievements of the club over the past year. The evening's highlights included guest speaker Sarah Good, City of Cornwall councillor, who shared some of the ups and downs of her own story emphasizing that her philosophy is to incorporate joy into all aspects of her daily

life, with both her family and her surrounding community. She emphasized that community engagement is an essential role for everyone, and particularly for women.

The AGM marked the conclusion of a year long celebration of the club's 70th anniversary. Jennifer Adams and Lois Scammel, co-chairs for the celebration, gave a final presentation featuring the milestones, contributions of the club to local charities, life-long learning and fellowship opportunities that members have enjoyed through the years. Other 70th

anniversary events throughout the year included a Gala Luncheon in September, with guest speaker Senator Bernadette Clement; planting of a commemorative Acolade Elm tree in Lamoureux Park; monthly presentations on the history of CFUW Cornwall and District; and a special donation to Hospice Cornwall. Every year, CFUW Cornwall and District awards scholarships to several deserving high school graduates who plan to continue their education. Since its inception 70 years ago, the club has presented a total of \$173,000. This year 14 scholarships of \$1,000 each will be awarded to young women graduating from high schools in Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Three club members were recognized for their long-term commitment to CFUW Cornwall and District. Sheila Casgrain was entered into the club's Book of Honour for dedication and support of CFUW, especially her leadership of the Scholarship Committee and contributions to the Executive Committee. Carol Esdale and Lorraine Sharron were presented flowers and recognized for their dedicated leadership of the Communications and Membership Committee, respectively, and the important impact their involvement has had club success.

The new club executive consists of Heather Megill (President), Beth Grant (Past President), Sheila Casgrain (Scholarship Chair, Jennifer

Twelve Gals at the Dump

On June 5th twelve of our members spent a fascinating morning at the Moose Creek Landfill and Compost facility, part of the larger organization **GFL (Green for Life)**. The facility receives 755,000 tonnes of landfill waste per year, and 240,000 tonnes of organic waste for composting every year and is continually expanding. Many environmental controls are in place and added to as needed to ensure the facility operates in accordance with environmental approvals as it processes, stores and/or transforms the waste.



Our wonderful host and guide Greg Van Loenen provided oodles of information about the site. He talked about “listening to the problem” as the approach made by the GFL engineers and scientists who strive to lead in the development of creative environmentally friendly innovations that maximize the benefits of the solid waste products that they receive, in addition to minimizing the burden that they pose.

Greg explained that because of the ready availability of clay found naturally in the area, their landfill site preparation begins with removing the topsoil to create non-porous clay “basins” as the base of their landfill hills or cells. This preparation prevents any water that contacts the garbage, called “leachate” (or as Greg referred to as

“garbage juice”), from escaping into the soil below and contaminating the surrounding area.

The leachate requires treatment, and so it is collected and processed to reach a high standard of purity to meet imposed environmental standards. Finally, the purified water is released into Moose Creek itself. Most landfills haul their leachate to other sites for treatment, but Moose Creek opted to fully treat their leachate onsite, removing the need for thousands of trucks to transport the liquid waste to another facility.



In addition to producing leachate, the natural anaerobic decomposition of landfill products produces a large quantity of methane gas, a product much more harmful to our environment than CO₂. **GFL** has a system of collecting this gas and directing it to the onsite “Landfill Gas To Energy” facility, where it fuels electrical turbines that generate electricity to provide power to approximately 4,000 homes.

All excess gas is burned via flare stacks, producing less harmful CO₂ and water as byproducts. Although not a perfect solution, it is better than the alternative of releasing methane directly into the atmosphere. **GFL** continues to explore options for more beneficial re-use of excess methane collected from the landfill.



Organic waste items are collected and sorted, and approximately 80-90% of the products that are received are composted over a period of approximately one month. The compost includes household organics, yard waste, and wood chips. Greg showed us some of the resultant product, which looks like very rich black soil that any of us would be pleased to use in our own gardens. The facility sells some of this compost to be used in Triple Mix garden products, as well as using it at the facility itself. When the landfill cells are full, a non-porous cover is placed over the landfill and then covered with this rich compost mix and grass.

Throughout the visit Greg mentioned quite a few nature-friendly strategies used at the site, resulting from some very creative thinking. One example of this is the planting of very thirsty and fast-growing willow trees into the bottom of a holding pond where excess treated water can be retained and evapotranspired. This approach allows for additional onsite capacity for water treatment and carbon sequestration from the atmosphere. As well, Greg showed us a sizable solar collector that serves to heat the floors in the GFL office.

As usual, CFUW members are a hungry lot, and we capped off the visit with lunch at Katarina's Corner Kitchen in Monkland. Yum.

Greg Van Loenen has agreed to provide another opportunity for an additional 12 members of our club to visit this interesting facility in September.

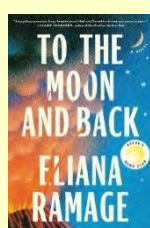
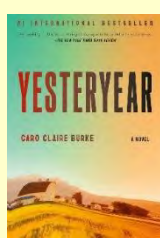
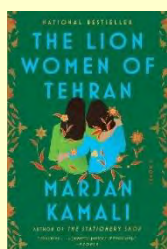
The Gourmet Group meets four times a year – in September for an appetizer evening followed by three themed evenings throughout the year.
